Leprosy destroys because lepers don't feel pain. They don't respond to burnps, cuts, or infections on their own bodies even though they know they're there. Dr. Brand wondered if the same



Peter and Andrew were the first disciples. The third and fourth were “James son of Zebedee and his brother John.” How old can you be when people refer to you as the brother and the son of a fisherman? In the ancient world boys went to work on their own at a very young age, yet John was fishing with his dad when Jesus called him. He was probably very young.

Only once in the Bible do we hear a baby cry. He was floating in a papyrus basket, caught up in the riverbank reeds of the Nile. His name was Moses and the Pharaoh wanted him dead.

The most powerful man in the world wanted to protect his power by drowning all the Hebrew baby boys in his kingdom. But his plan was thwarted by women's love. Two Hebrew midwives risked their lives for love by fooling the Pharaoh. Moses got saved by an Egyptian princess. His quick-witted sister suggested a

woman to nurse the baby: Moses' own mother!

The most powerful king on earth was subverted by women's love: two midwives, a daughter, a sister and a mother—that's what made the entire Biblical story possible—women's love. It's what set us free from bondage. Now it's time to return the favor.

brothers and toward the poor and needy...”

Christ is masterfully reminding us that God assumes that we have the poor among us and we’re openhanded to them while he is also telling us that something enormous is happening as he moves towards his last supper, death and resurrection. Don’t miss it!

Through his death and resurrection Christ is always with us now, but in today’s world the poor may or may not be. It is easier than ever to shelter ourselves from the billion people who live on less than \$1 a day. They’re not necessarily with us.

Water is the most crucial concern for those in extreme poverty. Something powerful happens when the world’s poor are with us through prayer. We fulfill God’s expectation, and because Christ is with us too, something enormous happens.



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Most of everything is nothing. Physicists say that far more than 99.9% of what we perceive to be solid matter is actually empty space. A purely material view of things does not account for the vast majority of reality. That's why the apostle Paul said "we live by faith, not by sight."
